## Job Market Spotlight



**Dr. Brandon Craig** (he/they) is a Postdoctoral Teaching Associate in the School of Criminology and Criminal Justice at Northeastern University for the 2025-2026 academic year. They are currently on the market for academic and non-academic positions beginning Summer or Fall 2026.

Dr. Craig's scholarship is primarily focused on the experiences of LGBTQ+ individuals across several related social phenomena: violence, social networks, public opinion, and media representation. Their dissertation, "*Exploring Entanglements: A Multi-Method Network Perspective on Intimate Partner Violence and Drug Use Among Sexual Minority Men*," applied social network analysis methods to examine the interrelatedness of sex and drug use networks, violent victimization, and attributes like HIV status within a marginalized population.

You can find their work in various journals including the *Journal of Interpersonal Violence*, *Social Problems*, and *Social Science Research*. They have experience teaching criminology courses on a variety of topics, making them an ideal candidate. Courses include: Crime, Media & Politics; Criminal Justice Process; Criminal Violence; Gender, Crime & Justice; Race, Crime & Justice; and Research Methods.

### The Department of Criminal Justice at Indiana University South Bend

The Department of Criminal Justice at Indiana University South Bend is currently seeking qualified applicants for a tenure track position beginning August 1 2026. A Ph.D. in Criminal Justice or Criminology is required and ABD candidates will be considered as long as a PhD in Criminal Justice or Criminology is in hand by the time of appointment. A JD and/or EdD degree alone is not sufficient. The full-time load (100% FTE) is 12 credit hours (typically four courses) each fall and spring semester, with one course (25% FTE) reassigned time for scholarly and creative activities following university & campus policies. Successful applicants will be expected to demonstrate a commitment to quality instruction, maintain an active research agenda, and be willing to engage in service activities. Successful applicants should have teaching experience in core courses such as Introduction to Criminal Justice and Criminological Theory. Although distinct specialization is open, teaching and research experience in at least two of the following areas will be given preference: Criminal Justice Statistics, Research Methods, Race and Crime, and Comparative Criminal Justice Systems.

Qualifications include:

- PhD in Criminal Justice or Criminology in hand before August 1, 2026. A JD and/or EdD alone is not sufficient.
- Teaching experience in Introduction to Criminal Justice and Criminological Theory.
- Teaching experience and the ability to teach a minimum of two of the following courses: Criminal Justice Statistics, Research Methods, Race and Crime, Comparative Criminal Justice Systems, Terrorism, Corrections and Criminal Justice, and/or Courts and Criminal Justice.
- An active research agenda.
- Excellent communication skills.
- A commitment to quality undergraduate instruction.
- A willingness to engage with faculty committed to quality learning.

### The Department of Sociology at the University of Massachusetts Boston

The Department of Sociology at the University of Massachusetts Boston (UMB) invites qualified persons to apply for a tenure-track assistant professor position to join our faculty beginning September 1, 2026.

Candidates should have demonstrated research and teaching strengths in the sociology of gender/sexualities with a preference for candidates who can teach Queer Theory/Methods. Candidates who are able to teach a first-year course for sociology majors requiring qualitative methods preferred. Candidates should have an emerging/established research program with the potential to generate external funding, a strong commitment to teaching and mentoring, the capacity to expand diversity initiatives on campus, and enhance the university's commitment to public service. The normal teaching load for tenure-track faculty at UMB is 2-2 over the academic year. Candidates are expected to teach courses across our undergraduate and graduate programs.

Our department serves a large undergraduate program with majors in Sociology and Criminology & Criminal Justice. We also offer graduate programs including a Master's and PhD in Sociology.

The Carnegie Foundation classifies UMB as an R-1 (Very High Research Spending and Doctorate Production) doctoral-granting and community-engaged university. There are many collaborative opportunities for scholars focusing on the sociology of gender/sexualities via the Women's, Gender and Sexuality Studies department, the Gender, Leadership, and Public Policy Certificate program, the Consortium on Gender, Security and Human Rights, and the Center for Women in Politics & Public Policy.

The candidate must have a doctoral degree in Sociology or a closely related discipline no later than August 31, 2026.
